



A message from the Prime Minister

It is 200 years since Parliament passed the Act to abolish the slave trade in the British Empire – the start of a long road to abolition.

The slave trade was a profoundly inhuman enterprise and the bicentenary provides us with an opportunity to express our sorrow that it happened.

It also enables us to remember those who suffered and who campaigned for abolition, and to re-double our efforts to address the legacy of the slave trade and to tackle injustice in the world today.

Among the abolitionists were great parliamentarians, slaves and former slaves and countless ordinary people. In Britain, working class men and women with no vote spoke out against a practice on which their local economies thrived. I welcome the impressive programme of activities in the ports and other cities. This calendar shows a few of them.

Today, ordinary people are continuing to fight for justice and equality, and leading commemorative events. It is important for Government to raise awareness and facilitate, not to tell people how to remember. So I am launching this calendar to show a selection of what is going on. It is intended to inform, encourage you to find out more and stimulate ideas for further action.

As well as reflecting on the past, we want to look to the present and future. In 2007, we will step up our efforts on three sets of pressing issues: the challenges facing the African continent, inequality for people of African and Caribbean heritage in the UK, and the cruelty of modern day slavery such as people trafficking and child labour.


We have a strong programme to address modern slavery, with legislation, international co-operation, enforcement and support for victims. Last year we opened the first human trafficking centre. But we have a lot more to do this year and we will apply pressure wherever we can to end this abhorrent practice.

Our unifying theme of the year is education-learning about our history; access to education for every child in Africa; addressing inequalities in education in the UK; and education to support our fight against contemporary slavery. You will hear about action on all these fronts during the year.

Hundreds of other events will mark the bicentenary at international, national and local level, involving community, faith and cultural groups, schools, local authorities and others.

This anniversary is a chance for all of us to deepen understanding of our heritage, celebrate the richness of our diversity and increase our determination to shape the world with the values we share.

I hope you will get involved in some way. There should be something for everyone. This is everyone's bicentenary.
